### ***Top Classic Books to Read This Summer***

#### ***1. Ulysses (by James Joyce)***

The story chronicles the passage of Leopold Bloom through Dublin on June 16, 1904 and strikes parallels between Homer's epic poem The Odyssey.

#### ***2. Moby Dick (by Herman Melville)***

Ishamel narrates about Captain Ahab's quest to find Moby Dick, the white whale, who on an earlier voyage destroyed his ship and severed his leg at the knee.

#### ***3. Hamlet (by William Shakespeare)***

A tragedy about the revenge Prince Hamlet is called to inflict on his uncle, Claudius, by the ghost of his father, King Hamlet, who Claudius murdered.

#### ***4. 1984 (by George Orwell)***

Winston Smith loses his identity living under a repressive regime. While working as a government employee whose job is to rewrite history in order to cast his country's leaders in a favorable light, Smith learns there is no escaping Big Brother.

#### ***5. The Catcher in the Rye (by J.D. Salinger)***

The story takes place in the 1950s where Holden Caulfield, the narrator, does not disclose specifics about his location except that he is undergoing treatment in a mental hospital.

#### ***6. Pride and Prejudice (by Jane Austen)***

The story centers around the Bennett family, particularly Elizabeth, who is one of five unmarried sisters that their mother, Mrs. Bennett, wishes to marry off.

#### ***7. The Great Gatsby (by F. Scott Fitzgerald)***

Gatsby is known for his lavish parties each weekend at his mansion in West Egg and is suspected of being involved in illegal activities. The narrator of the story is Nick Carraway, Gatsby's neighbor in West Egg.
